Course Description:

This course provides a historical overview of the abuse of alcohol and other drugs in the United States. The material that is covered includes classification of drugs, historical review of drug laws, prohibition, theories of addiction, treatment strategies/interventions, cultural perspectives, special populations, education, prevention, resources that are available to people with a substance abuse problem, and resources that are available to the family members of people with a substance abuse problem.

Course Objectives:

During this course, students will identify

- a) the history of drug use, legalization and law enforcement
- b) major pharmacological classifications of drugs,
- c) physiological and psychological effects of substance use and dependence
- d) the impact of alcohol and drugs in the United States and the Apache Nation
- e) the consequences of substance use during pregnancy and the impact of use on the family
- f) substance abuse and mental illness
- g) overview of treatment and recovery models

Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs): (Three to Six)

After completion of the course students will be able to

- a) define chemical dependency, substance abuse, tolerance, withdrawal, slip, relapse, fetal alcohol syndrome, HIV, and gateway drugs
- b) name eight pharmacological classifications of drugs
- c) name and describe at least three specific drugs within each pharmacological classification
- d) describe specific behaviors that are considered to be signs of adolescent substance abuse
- e) describe why the involvement of the family of a person with an alcohol or drug problem is considered to be critical for his/her recovery
- f) name four models of treatment for substance use disorders
- g) describe why substance abuse prevention efforts are necessary
- h) articulate issues related to providing treatment to persons with co-occurring psychiatric disorders
- i) describe the impact of substance abuse on the individual and family.

Course Structure:

The learning experience in this course will be accomplished through readings, lectures, class discussions, reflective journal writing, and written examinations.

The instructional design combines didactic presentations and class discussions with a focus on applying and reinforcing the course content.

Attitudes toward substance abuse are addressed throughout the course as students share information and personal experiences and apply the concepts covered in the course.

Relevancy of specific issues and concepts as they pertain to the Apache Nation (e.g., alcohol abuse, drug abuse, substance use during pregnancy, adolescent substance use, the impact of substance abuse on the family, and substance abuse treatment) is an integral component of this course.
