COURSE TITLE, NUMBER, AND CREDITS: ACC 101 Financial Accounting,

PRE-REQUISITES (if any): None, but ACC 100 is strongly recommended

REQUIRED LAB (if any): None

COURSE DESCRIPTION: Introduces accounting as a service activity, analytical discipline, and information system. Includes quantitative information to make decisions, identification of events that characterize economic activity, and the collection and communication of economic activity. Also includes recording accounting data, internal control of assets, measurement and reporting of liabilities and owner's equity.

COURSE CONTENTS AND RATIONALE: This is first of the two transfer courses for the AA in Business, and a prerequisite for ACC 102 Managerial Accounting. The course exposes the students to the preparation and analysis of financial reports.

SPECIFIC OBJECTIVES FOR THE STUDENT

At the completion of this course the student should be able to: accurately complete the steps in accounting cycle; manage accounting for assets, including inventories, receivables and fixed asset depreciation; prepare, analyze and interpret financial statements.
