Dr. Martín M. Ahumada

San Carlos Apache College President

Dr. Martín Miguel Ahumada has been serving as the Founding President of San Carlos Apache College since April 11, 2017. Prior to stewarding America's youngest tribal institution of higher learning, Dr. Ahumada served as the Provost and Interim President of Diné College in the Navajo Nation. He also served as the President of the International Center for Higher Education & Philanthropy, and as a professor of higher education leadership at Harvard University where he was the chief advisor to Native American and international students pursuing doctorate degrees in the field. Throughout his 38-year career in higher education, Dr. Ahumada has served as an advisor to education ministers and university presidents in different countries, as a senior administrator with national and state level commissions of higher education as well as leading universities and community colleges. He earned his Bachelor's Degree from Carleton College in Minnesota and his Master's and Ph.D. degrees in Higher Education Administration from the University of Arizona. Dr. Ahumada has earned many distinguished awards, including Harvard University's prestigious ALANA Award as the outstanding faculty member of the year, Carleton College's Alumni Award for Distinguished Achievement, Eastern New Mexico University's Father of the ENMU Foundation Award, and the University of Arizona Foundation's Distinguished Citizen Award. In November 2019, Dr. Martín Ahumada was inducted into the Alumni Hall of Fame of his alma mater: Pueblo High School in Tucson.



Kathy Kitcheyan

Invocation Leader

Professor Kathy Wesley-Kitcheyan is leading San Carlos Apache College's historic role and work of preserving and revitalizing the Apache Language, history, and culture. The new courses she is developing center on intensive reading and writing in Apache, on Apache history for the time period of 1800 to 1934 (when the Indian Reorganization Act was enacted), on the history of the San Carlos Apache tribal government from 1934 to the present, and on the contemporary issues of the San Carlos Apache Tribe. Professor Wesley-Kitcheyan brings to SCA a rich educational background plus a wealth of professional experience and expertise in the arenas of education, health, government, nonprofit management, and social services. She earned her higher education degrees from Northern Arizona University, including a Bachelor's of Science, a Masters' degree in Educational Leadership. She was the first Chairwoman of the San Carlos Apache Tribe, the Vice President of the Inter-Tribal Council of Arizona, the Southwest Representative of the National Congress of American Indians, the President of the Sen Gaa Isdzane Association, and a member of the National Indian Health Board. She served as a highly regarded teacher and Principal of San Carlos High School, and Executive Director of the Department of Health and Human Services.





Ken Duncan

Master of Ceremonies

Ken Duncan, an enrolled member of the San Carlos Apache Tribe, is an accomplished performer, cultural teacher, flute player, artist and traditional storyteller. He is a graduate of the Institute of the American Indian Arts in Santa Fe, New Mexico. Mr. Duncan is the founder/director of a renowned family dance company, the Yellow Bird Indian Dancers. Ken was named Cultural Keeper of Arizona by Arizona's Governor's Office in 2004 and was recognized with the Arizona Native American Business of the Year Award in 2015. In the last 20 years, Ken was invited to perform in the opening festivities at the 2012 London Summer Olympics, published in Chicken Soup for the Fisherman's Soul book series, a consultant for the Heard Museum, Arizona Historical Museum, Animal Planet, the Discovery Channel as well as the Travel Channel. Mr. Duncan consulted and acted in productions with the Utah Metropolitan Ballet Company. Mr. Duncan is a Goodwill Ambassador for the U. S. State Dept. and the Dept. of Defense, having visited American embassies, American military bases in over 60 countries. Currently, Ken is a cultural consultant at the Desert Botanical Garden's Plants & Peoples Trail, board member for the Superstition Mountain Museum and lifetime board member for the World Indigenous Council in Milan, Italy. Next month, he will be working on a project with the History Channel, co-producing performances with the Phoenix Boys Choir and developing an Apache cultural village in Apache Junction sponsored by the National Humanities Council. But . . . Mr. Duncan says he is most proud he is a husband of 42 years to his high school sweetheart, father of 7 sons, 1 daughter and grandfather to 8 beautiful grandchildren.



Vernelda Grant

Commencement Speaker

Vernelda J. Grant is an enrolled member of the San Carlos Apache Tribe. She received her undergraduate degree in 1996, in Cultural Anthropology with a minor in English and in 1999, a Master's degree in Applied Anthropology with an emphasis in Southwestern Archaeology from Northern Arizona University. In March 2000, Vernelda returned to her Tribe creating a new position and a new tribal Department. It has been a lifelong goal to work for her people as the Director and Tribal Archaeologist of the Historic Preservation & Archaeology Department. In 1996, Vernelda interned with the Smithsonian Institution's National Museum of Natural History Repatriation Office in Washington, DC, Vernelda has served three terms on the Arizona Governor's Archaeology Advisory Commission, was appointed to the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (DC Office) Native American Advisory Group, is an ambassador with the Americans for Indian Opportunity, and has served as Chair of the National Congress of American Indians Commission on Repatriation and Burial Sites Protection. Ms. Grant is active in grassroots, tribal, state, federal government-to-government work and consultation, and has testified in the general assembly of nation-states at the United Nations in New York City. Her extensive working knowledge and experience in cultural resource management including her formal training in anthropology and archaeology helps Vernelda to advocate for the protection and preservation of culture, language and history as well as sacred and holy places and landscapes important to the existence and spiritual livelihood of the San Carlos Apache Tribe, all Native American Tribes and Indigenous Peoples. Vernelda lives in Peridot, Arizona close to her family who have served as her role models and instilled in her the importance of education, leadership and strength through prayer.
