Course Description

Course Description: Principles of nutrition presented in the context of human biology. Includes chemistry, digestion, absorption, and metabolism of nutrients. Also includes biological and nutritional perspectives on various health issues such as cardiovascular disease, hypertension, cancer, diabetes, and osteoporosis. Lectures and labs are integrated into this class.

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Analyze and compare healthful diets using several sources, including food labels, the Nutrition Facts panel, USDA Food Patterns, and digital analysis tools.
- 2. Explain how the human body digests, absorbs and eliminates foods with each organ of the digestive tract.
- 3. Describe the functions of carbohydrates, lipids, and proteins in the body and the roles these macromolecules play in metabolism.
- 4. Identify functions of specific vitamins and minerals and how they act as electrolytes, antioxidants, and essential nutrients in bone and blood material.
- 5. Explain changes in nutrient needs for fetal development based on physiologic changes in pregnant women during the course of a pregnancy. Identify nutrient requirements for lactation and explain nutrient needs during stages of infant growth.
- 6. Use the scientific method to investigate diet. Comprehensively collect accurate data, analyze evidence, and communicate findings.

Course Structure

This course is **asynchronous** and fully online so students will work on their own independent time. The class will not meet at a set time. Lecture material will include videos and open online resources. Students will post and read discussion comments, compose short essays, complete assignments, and record dietary data to analyze and interpret. Live virtual meetings with the instructor will be scheduled to examine understanding, give feedback, tutoring and clarification of course content.

Incomplete Policy

Late assignment submissions will be accepted if approved by the instructor. Grading will be delayed on late submissions. Late submissions must be accompanied by a message notifying the instructor of the assignment title in Canvas and the extenuating circumstances for the late submission.

Assignment Descriptions

Discussion Posts

Each week, students will post research questions on a discussion topic. The topic will be related to the reading for the week. All written compositions are required to be unique. Narratives must never be copied and pasted. Pasting full sentences is plagiarism. Students will face disciplinary action for academic dishonesty for copying and pasting full sentences or narratives from any other author or textbook. In-text citations with paraphrasing that include the author and year at the end of the sentence are acceptable, but **pasting full sentences from other authors with quotations is not acceptable**. Students will be required to read and reply to other students' research questions in the discussions. Students must post appropriate commentary and be considerate of their peers and classmates.

Publication Research

Students will review primary source scientific research articles from peer-reviewed journals and not secondary information from entertainment-based web pages. Research will provide more depth than book topics and focus on individual students' interests. Students will choose research publications that other students have not chosen. **Sentences must never be copied and pasted with quotation marks from other authors, websites, or books**. Science writing avoids all quotation marks. You must paraphrase or rephrase in your own words instead. All written compositions are required to be unique. Narratives must never be copied and pasted. Pasting full sentences is plagiarism. Students will face disciplinary action for academic dishonesty for copying and pasting full sentences or narratives from any other author. In-text citations with paraphrasing that include author and year at the end of the sentence is acceptable, but pasting full sentences from other authors with quotations is not acceptable. Students may not copy from ChatGPT and other Al composition assistant tools; rather, they will need to rephrase or paraphrase what is generated with the help of Al tools.

Labs (Food Journals, Diet Analysis)

Students will record every item they eat and drink for one day each week but may omit any items they wish to refrain from disclosing for personal reasons. Information from Food Journal Labs will remain confidential and not be made available to other students. Students will use the Food Journals to identify nutrients, minerals, vitamins, fats, carbohydrates, proteins, quantities, and patterns in their diets. Students will use the free version of the Chronometer app to track and calculate food items. Students also have the option to use basic spreadsheets such as Google Sheets.

Essays

Students will use the textbook readings, lab entries, and publications to compose essays. The prompt for each essay is one of the learning outcomes for the course. Students show evidence of fulfilling course learning outcomes by completing the essays. Students will submit outlines

and drafts and revise them based on instructor feedback before submitting final drafts. Sentences must never be copied and pasted with quotation marks from other authors, websites, or books.

Science writing avoids all quotation marks. Information from other sources will be paraphrased or rephrased in the words and voice of the student. All written compositions are required to be unique. Narratives must never be copied and pasted. Pasting full sentences is plagiarism. Students will face disciplinary action for academic dishonesty for copying and pasting full sentences or narratives from any other author. In-text citations with paraphrasing that include author and year at the end of the sentence is acceptable, but pasting full sentences from other authors with quotations is not acceptable.

Students may use AI tools to assist in the composition of written materials. The tool must be stated in the methods part of the essay. Students will describe how they revised what the AI tool generated.

Case Studies

Case Studies are critical thinking and problem solving exercises based are factual or historical cases and real people. Students are prohibited from copying and pasting answers to these assignments from other sources. Students will work in groups to complete Case Study Assignments.

Communication

Faculty/Student Communication

A faculty member will respond to a student's communication within 24 hours of receiving the communication excluding weekends and college closures. If a course is online a faculty will login their Canvas classroom a minimum of three times per week spread evenly throughout the week and respond to any discussion posts and check on student progress in the course.

Course Feedback:

All assignments will be graded and returned to the students promptly, typically within a week after the assignment is closed for handing in. Email and phone messages will be returned within 24 hours. A student or the instructor may request a student conference at any time during the semester. Quarterly grade reports will be provided to each student, either in person, by email or via the electronic system of Canvas.
